THREE ROB FRASER BANK, ESCAPE

BANDITS ROB BANK FLEE AMID SHOTS FIRED BY VIGILANTE

No trace had been found late today of three daring young robbers who held up the State Bank of Fraser, near Halfway, Michigan, and escaped with \$1,180.

The three fled in a shower of bullets from the guns of an assistant cashier of the bank and a member of the Macomb County Vigilante. The bandits, while brandishing revolvers during the holdup made no effort to return the fire as they sped toward Detroit.

Walter A. Miller, whose office is directly across from the bank, pursued the thugs for a mile, but was out-distanced. Other citizens, summoned by the vigilante Alarm, got into autos and searched the country-side, futilely.

Miller, the Vigilante, who with assistant Cashier Theodore Bohn, fired several rounds of shots at the fleeing car, said he did not believe any of the bullets had taken effect.

The Vigilante alarm sounds in the banks and many of the offices in Macomb County. It is a distress signal which is answered by citizens as well as police. But for one defect in the arrangement, it was pointed out, the bandits might have been captured. The alarm does not indicate what bank or business is in distress.

As a result, when Miller ran from his office, he had no way of knowing that it was the bank directly across the street from him that was being robbed. One of the thugs ran out of the door. He was carrying a bundle - the money. But he had no gun. Miller ordered him to halt, and the thug complied. Miller advanced toward him as the second thug came from the bank -and then both thugs took to their heels.

CAR IS WAITING

Bohn ran from the bank and then he Miller opened fire. The bandit car was waiting about 100 feet from the bank door. A confederate was at the wheel. The two men jumped on the running board and climbed inside as the auto, a small coupe, rattled off in the direction of Detroit.

One of the bullets found its way into the dining room of Mrs. Andrew Ulenburg, who lives several hundred feet from the bank. The bullet entered the baseboard under a dining room window which opens on the front porch. It passed

through the wall and dropped to the dining room floor. Mrs. Ulenburg was in another room.

The two thugs entered the bank shortly after 10 a.m. today. Both walked to the wicket behind which (Theodore) Bohn and Elmor Kleino, another assistant cashier were standing. The two bank men found themselves gazing into the muzzles of two automatics.

HAND CASHIER NOTE

One of the robbers pushed a note through the window. It bore the legend that they were "covered", and a demand for "all the cash you've got."

Kleino stood nearest the window. He received the note and promptly handed over a packet of currency - \$1,180. Bohn, standing behind Kleino, stepped on the Vigilante alarm. The bandit who had taken the pile of currency, and who was met by Miller at the door, was the first to start away at the sound of the bell. He pocketed his gun. The second man kept the two cashiers covered as he backed to the door.

Elmor Kleino stated that it was a 1918 rifle, army surplus supplied to all banks at a reduced cost was use... Possibly a 3240 shell...

As told to Audrey DeFauw by Mr. John Ulenburg, son of Mrs. Andrew Ulenburg... "The room was the front living room where the bullet entered and embedded itself into an oak table used as a desk. Mrs. Ulenburg was dusting in the living room at the time.' 'The house now belongs to Audrey DeFauw, and is the Fraser Florist.

Also, Mr. Norman Reindel also stated that Jim Steffens, another vigilante went to the Roseville Bank and talked to Norm Reindel about the robbery which was taking place at Fraser... You see, their system told them that a bank in the area was being robbed, but not which one.

June 1, 1993 additions to the story as told to us by David Bohn, son of Theodore Bohn... The bandit several years later came back to the bank and asked Mr. Bohn to go for a cup of coffee with him. He told him that he had paid for his crime as he was now out of prison.


