



OLD TIMERS INDUCTED INTO FRASER ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

On October 9, 1997, the Hall of Fame held its fourth class of inductees at Fern Hill Country Club. The athletic awards are given out every two years honoring men and women who were outstanding as a FHS athlete. The Hall of Fame is housed at Fraser High School and is funded by the Fraser Athletic Booster Club. The inductees are selected by a committee of Fraser coaches and administrators from a list of candidates. This year for the first time, candidates from the 1930's and 1940's were selected for induction. Records and record keeping in the early years of Fraser sports were poorly kept or lost over the years. Newspaper coverage of county sports was almost non-existent. The selection committee dubbed the new inductees the "old timers". The inductees included Ray Engel, Larry Hartsig, Bill Starkey, Ken Sauder, Ed Lafriniere and Ed Ringler. The awards to Ken Sauder and Ed Lafrineire were given posthumorusly. Honorary memberships were awarded to former Superintendent Ralph Miller and former Principal Cass Shaft. Both men had been instrumental in developing and coaching in early years of Fraser Athletics. Also honored was Mel Banks, class of '63.

Special honors were received by the 1942 girl's softball team. This was Fraser High Schools first undefeated team. Attending the banquet were eight members of that team and their coach, Ida May Hein, Ann Metz, Lois Lafriniere, Evelyn Eberlein, Shirley Tetzloff, Jean Raudall, Margaret Rich, Rosemary Hartsig and coach Frances Minger.

Teachers in the 40's

Mr. DuBois

Mr. DuBois wore his reading glasses perched at the end of his nose. Periodically he checked on his first year typing students without leaving his desk by peering through the glass wall that ran the length of the lab. If anyone was talking he'd glare over the rims of those glasses and tap on the window with his pencil. We sometimes referred to him as Mr. Five by Five, but never within his hearing. His wide girth at the beltline made him seem even shorter than he was. His bald head and spectacles gave him an owlish appearance.

He wore the same dark unpressed suit all year long, and one usually could judge from the condition of his time and shirt front what he had been eating for lunch. Miss Burgess, our art teacher, was overheard scolding him when she caught him washing first his tea cup, then his hands in the drinking fountain which was across from her room.

Mr. Edgar Lee DuBois taught shorthand and bookkeeping in addition to typewriting classes. I can't speak for his abilities (or lack of them) in the other subjects, but no one in Typing could get away with either an overstrike or an erasure. Those reading glasses at the end of his nose were our nemesis.

Miss Richmond

Miss Richmond stood at the front of our English class, hands gripping the desk to steady herself. Wearing a dress of an earlier era, a few wisps of her hair sticking out from a poorly constructed wig, it was obvious even to 8th and 9th grade students that she was well beyond her prime. She had just finished giving her rendition of Helen Keller learning to talk. Of course it wasn't a topic to be laughed at and we all knew better than to make fun of our elders, but her performance was simply too much. We adolescents couldn't handle it, nor even appreciate it. And our giggles infuriated her, which led to more giggles.

This English class in the midforties was only one of several at F.H.S. that had to endure teachers who were "over the hill" in terms of age and who had lost their former abilities to keep youngsters in line. It was World War II and the young male teachers were all in the service. The larger schools, able to pay more, had taken the choicest of the remaining qualified teachers.

Sadie Richmond was one of those and she taught English classes. After her performance, she demanded...as firmly as she could speak...that the class come to order. It didn't. Then, in her high wavery voice she threatened, "I'll call the men" Sadie always referred to the superintendent and principal as "the men." Dutifully, either Mr. Miller or Mr. Willis would show up and listen to her pleas. The minute either of those authority figures stepped into her classroom we all stopped giggling and were-respectful. The minute they vanished into the hall, we all broke out into chatter and mild horseplay, as I'm sure they knew we would.

None of us would have dared call her Sadie to her face but we always used her given name outside of class. Beverly Lee Saulman and Marilyn LaFell did reasonably good imitations of Miss Sadie Richmond and always cracked us up.

Mr. Burdick

I was in Mr. Burdick's World History class an entire term and what I remember best is a series of exotic sounding names. Halicarnassus. The Rosetta Stone. The Peloponnesian Wars. The Code of Hammurabi. He was big on The Fertile Crescent. Babylon also comes to mind. And 1066. He seemed to me, even though I was so young, a true classical scholar. He loved his subject and knew it thoroughly, although his presentation marked him a bit of a stuffed shirt.



But what set Mr. Burdick apart was the fact that for the first few weeks of classes that fall, he slept in his hearse. Yes, I said hearse. He drove it around town as casually as the local farmers drove their Chevys.

At that time, the Opel and Pinger families were renting the old Steffens homestead on Utica Road. There were some small outbuildings in the back which no one had used for years. Mr. Burdick managed to get permission from Mrs. Miller (Owen's mother) and her sisters, who were the current owners, to park his vehicle behind our house and use those outbuildings for his personal needs. (You can read between the lines.)

In those wartime years there was no building going on, no apartment complex, and few houses in town with unused rooms to rent out. Fortunately for Mr. Burdick he didn't have to use his hearse as a bedroom for long. Ralph Bielawski recently reminded me that the history teacher found lodging with Roger Morrison's family. But as long as that hearse was parked nights in our backyard, you can be certain that we tried to stay clear of it as much as possible.


