

For over 20 years, the Fraser High School Alumni Club has delighted hundreds of past graduates with its hospitality in keeping alive the Rambler spirit. With the annual newsletter, mailed every June, and the annual August picnic, alumni, staff and retirees can reminisce. Each year the club gives deserving graduating seniors an opportunity to continue their hard work academically, at a college of their choice.

In 2008, the 'Audrey 'Kleino' DeFauw Memorial Scholarship Fund' awarded two seniors a \$1,000 scholarship, with a total of \$22,400 being awarded to date.

Alison Krentz was the first recipient this year. Both of her parents attended Fraser High School. Her mother, Susan 'Polzin' Krentz, is from the Class of 1979, and her father, Jeff, was from the Class of 1977. Alison has spent her years at FHS participating in HOSA, softball, basketball and National Honor Society. Both in and out of high school, she has excelled, making the honor roll every quarter of her four years at FHS. She also raised \$1,000 for the Diabetes Research Foundation, and captained the junior volleyball team. Love Across the Country

This is not one of the many stories about high school sweethearts reconnecting and finding, uh, true love. It's the story about the most unlikely of high school classmates getting together - ones from entirely different social groups. How often does that happen?

In his Fraser, Mich., Class of '61 year book, senior Douglas Dobrei stands out as a star: good looks, class president, top spots in top sports and on the honor role. In Fraser, then a town of fewer than 7,000, Douglas was known to all, even Virginia Powers, a looker herself who ran a beauty shop out of her parents' home and who describes herself as "a terrible student." Being from different cliques, even in this smallest of towns, at school the two had hardly spoken. After graduation, Douglas went off to college on a sports scholarship; Virginia married a military man from California. However, in Douglas' yearbook Virginia had written "See you in California!" because he had a brother in Vacaville he said he might join up with someday. She didn't know she was predicting 45 years into the future. A lot happened in those years: marriages and divorces and two sons for each.

Teacher Feature

This year's teacher feature takes us into the life of Robert Lask, who taught Social Studies classes at Fraser High.

Bob was a first-generation American-born Jewish boy growing up in Detroit, when Nazi Germany was wreaking havoc on Europe - six million Jews were killed. By the time the war ended, he was 8 years old. The conflict didn't sink in then, but he learned so much about his heritage that he would use it in his classes when he would come to be a teacher.

He attended Wayne State University and taught in Detroit Public Schools for four years. Seymour Okun, foresaw an opening, in the Social Studies Department, in 1967, and called Bob to see if he would be interested in a suburban school district position. Bob accepted and was hired.

During his first few years, he played "shortstop" as he called it, teaching one section of history, one of American history, one of sociology, one of comparative religions, one of World history and one in psychology. Many times he volunteered to teach six classes per term without a formal prep period - he didn't mind. In the 60s & 70s, he also taught Humanities, Social Psychology and Russian history. "Not having a prep was not too difficult," he said. As he gained seniority, Bob would teach two or three sections of the various social studies. He enjoyed the variety of classes and made suggestions for new offerings - Comparative Religions, Russian history and some 10-week courses: Frontiers, Contemporary Social Problems were his suggestions. Enrollment climbed and more courses could be offered.

"I'm a storyteller so the Contemporary Social Problems course was one in which I would embellish upon personal experiences."

Bob Lask was NHS advisor, in charge of Honors Assembly, and Travel Club sponsor. (I remember going to D.C., at age 15, through that club, though Mr. Lask did not go that year. I had Mr. Muendelein and Mr. Butler instead.)

"The Washington trip was great for the kids," Bob recalled. "It gave the kids an opportunity to see how teachers were outside of the school environment. Sometimes my own kids had the privilege in accompanying the Fraser students on the trip."

Lask was also social director for Band Camp, "Kids loved the horror films I would show, but I never let them interfere with their practice."

He has taught Jewish education religious school for 55 years. He holds a Reform Jewish Educator's certificate in the Reform Movement. Only 200-300 people in the country have this (RJE). He was awarded the first in the state of Michigan. "I always wanted to further my religious teachings. An opportunity arose for me during the mid-80's. I was offered a position as Education Director at Temple Bethel." This position would put him in charge of running the curriculum and responsible for day-to-day activities for the youth movement. He approached the Fraser Board of Education for a leave of absence - they granted him that with highest regards for his success. Lask was in that position for six years. Not that it was enough, he also simultaneously was the dean of the College of Jewish Studies, Temple Israel, where he administered the adult courses taught there.

After six years and the gratification of that position, it was time to return to public school teaching. Lask came back as a Social Studies teacher. This time he was assigned to Richards Junior High. He suggested some advanced history courses there, which he taught with Judy Light, and also developed the ultimate trip to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

He has high regards for the staff at the school, especially administrators Ray Brunzell and Ed Grewe. It was through his hands-on teaching style that he was able to get the 7th grade records to be used to fulfill an 8th grade advanced history placement. He started the honor society at the junior high level -- the National Junior Honor Society (NJHS). Richards didn't have a chapter, so he established one there with administration agreement.

In more recent years, he ran the summer school program. too.

In 2001, he decided that it was time to retire. "My students made my time at Fraser a time I'll never forget. I left with sadness that it was time to go."

Always busy, he has since traveled to Australia, New Zealand and Fiji one year, has been on the Chinese mainland, vacationed in Yellowstone and visited Italy. He has also gone to Prague and Israel. His wife was in Vietnam one year, as an orchid judge. "It is not legal to bring the orchids here," Bob said.

He is still actively teaching. If you take a trip to the Holocaust Memorial Center in Farmington Hills, on Orchard Lake Road, you might see him leading a 90-minute tour as a docent. By the time tour is over, you may feel completely exhausted, no doubt from Lask's intense lessons during the tour -- highly recommended. At age 71, he never seems to quit. He's always on the move staying active and learning himself. I have fond memories of Mr. Lask and hopefully all his former students do too.

A letter arrived in the Alumni Club mailbox last summer asking about any information on the merger of the Cady Corners School District and the Fraser School District. Here is an article around the time period, reprinted in its entirety.....what a different world it was then.

It's All in the Day
Sept. 18, 1945

Mount Clemens Monitor Leader

Early this year, when children of Cady Corners School, Clinton Township District 5, went on strike because they had to walk six or seven miles a day, round-trip, to school, their parents backed them in a school strike and turmoil reigned in the school district for weeks.

When the voters in the district for the second or third time rejected the plan to finance a school bus, the dauntless parents of the protesting children formed a School Bus Club for the purchase and operation of a bus.

Since that time, not a line of undesirable publicity has been accorded this school district where fists once flew and pickets once circled the schoolhouse under the watching eyes of uniformed police officers...all is peaceful in Clinton District 5!

The school bus operation has been without mishap and very successful...more club members have joined the group.

Like all corporations, the group has found that a reserve fund is needed...and accord that a box social will be held on Saturday night, September 22 in the Star Ballroom, 31816 Utica Road, at Fraser. The festivities will start at 4 p.m., and all proceeds will go into the bus fund.

Our several readers might wonder why we are attaching so much importance to a box social...which ordinarily would find itself relegated to a small spot on the society pages.

This is no ordinary box social. It is designed to keep alive a project unique in this county...and one which was borne of strike, bickering and near-bloodshed. The success of the social affair will keep the bus rolling...so that tots of five and six years old will never again have to trudge along dangerous highways in the dark of a wintry morning...without even sidewalks

to guard them from automobile traffic.

That's why we regard the Cady Corners box social as a very deserving affair...and gladly lend a hand to Mrs. Floyd Malak, Mrs. Clarence Moorehead, Mrs. William Huetter and other ladies responsible for arranging it.

And if you've never been to a box social, now's your chance. It's even more fun than a picnic. The ladies bring the lunches and the men bid on them...the latter having the privilege of having lunch with the lady who prepared it...Refreshments and dancing are also on the program.

Macomb County Coaches Hall of Fame



Several Fraser High School coaches have previously been inducted into the Macomb County Coaches Hall of Fame. Names like Thomas Lusk, Donald Weichert, Donald Seiferlein, Jan Stephan, Ross MacDonald, Wilson Barns, Mario Borrocci, Willis Fifer, Alan Kastl, Thayer Mukhtar, and most recently, Lee O'Bryan adorn the walls of the Hall.

Let's take a look at our most recent inductee. Lee O'Bryan became interested in tennis as a child, and 50 years later, he still is enthralled with the sport. "Tennis has played a major role in my life for many years," said O'Bryan, assistant principal at Fraser High School. He began playing recreationally after sixth grade. "I haven't spent a summer since when I haven't either played, competed or taught tennis," said O'Bryan.

He first took to tennis in a summer recreation program led by Ramblers coach Ted Striewski.

There were many reasons that the sport appealed to O'Bryan right away, including instant gratification, success, and friendships formed. "Tennis caught my interest, satisfying my personal and social needs," he recalled.

It became more than a passing fad. Since the junior high and high school shared the same building, he stayed in contact with Striewski, who let him play in exhibition matches for two years.

When O'Bryan became a full-fledged Rambler, he settled in nicely at No. 2 singles as a freshman, playing No. 1 singles in his remaining three years, and reaching the state finals and becoming team captain, team MVP and All-League. He graduated from Fraser, in 1966.

O'Bryan played three seasons at Central Michigan University, opting out his senior year when he student-taught at Dearborn High. Still, he helped out the Pioneers' program, and that set the stage for his return to Fraser.

Hired as an English/Journalism teacher in 1970, O'Bryan also became the Ramblers' girls' tennis coach. For 26 years, until he became athletic director, he headed the team, compiling a 226-69 record that included 11 league titles, two regional crowns and eight team berths in the state finals. Fraser's girls were named Macomb County "Team of the Year" in 1990 and 1994, coincidentally the same two years O'Bryan was saluted as the county's "Coach of the Year." He also ran the boys' program for six years, qualifying two teams to state.

During summers, O'Bryan ran a five-week junior development tennis camp, which is still going strong after 30 years. "It raised the level of tennis in a community where tennis clubs were not common," O'Bryan said. "It became contagious and soon our summer program was drawing in players from other school districts in Macomb County."

Although he eventually became the Ramblers' athletic director, he continued to contribute to the game by directing pre- and post-season meetings, as well as hosting league tournaments and regional competitions. He was inducted into the Macomb County Coaches Hall of Fame in 2007.

Despite the improvement in organization, posted scheduling and live announcements, some alumni continue to miss out on the picture sessions. The reasons offered include not hearing the announcements, arriving too late, or leaving too early. Some even claim not to even know that pictures were being taken and were available for purchase. This would probably account for some of the late orders we received. This year we have decided to make just a few minor adjustments to improve the process even more. Last year was a success by all means and this year will be even better.



Older Persons Commission

As if teaching isn't time consuming enough - with the lesson plans to create, quizzes to photocopy, essays to correct, and equipment to set-up for gym class. Nancy Thoenes, FHS physical education chair, stays physically active year-round. Thoenes, 57, volleyball coach, who began her career in 1974, at Kennedy Jr. High, as Nancy Clark, participates in the Older Persons Commission, a prelude to the Michigan Senior Olympics. This event is open to all age 50 or over.



Thoenes and friend Sue Stroud, are a doubles in badminton - they practice in Rochester. Thoenes says that the benefits that come with badminton, like lifelong fitness, hand-eye coordination and teamwork, all carry over to other aspects of one's life. The Older Persons Commission gives Thoenes and Stroud a chance to have fun, stay in shape, and also compete. This is entirely different when they were younger, however.

In 1972, the Education Amendment, Title IX (Patsy Mink Equal Opportunity in Education Act), was passed. Prior to its passing, girls were not encouraged to participate in sports. This act virtually

prohibits discrimination on sex in education.

"Girls of those days were considered tomboys. I know I was. Today they are considered athletes," Thoenes said.

Thoenes recalls her very first year she coached junior high girls basketball and volleyball. "We had more than 80 girls turn out for one team. But they couldn't use the locker rooms, because it was determined that girls don't sweat."

The Senior Olympics is an outlet for competitive older women to compete in the sports that they've always liked to play. However, in August, Thoenes and partner expect to win big -- taking gold medals. The thought of athletic competition for those over 50 is not a fleeting thing. More than 100 other Michigan seniors will participate in the Olympics. For more info, go to michigianseniorolympics.org.



